
A leader's guide to influencing others

Influential Conversations is a high-impact one-day workshop where organisational leaders learn how to be more influential in their interactions with others.


#### **Why You Need This Programme**


- Leaders in your organisation want to have greater influence with clients, colleagues, subordinates, and senior management.
